The Sacrament of Baptism

The Sacrament is celebrated on Sundays at 1:30 PM. Parents, please call the parish office to arrange a meeting with one of our priests or deacons to begin to make arrangements.

The Sacrament of Eucharist

See front cover for mass times. If you are sick for an extended period of time or are homebound, please contact the parish office to arrange to have someone bring Communion to you.

The Sacrament of Confirmation

School aged children can prepare for this Sacrament by contacting our religious Education office. Adults or older teens who have yet to be Confirmed should contact the Parish Office

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

As listed on front cover or call rectory for an appointment with one of our priests.

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

This Sacrament is for the living. We celebrate this Sacrament each Spring and Fall for those who are chronically ill, advanced in age, or who are about to undergo surgery or hospitalization. We can arrange the Sacrament at other times by calling the Parish Office..

Prayer and Devotion Opportunities

Our Lady of Fatima Devotion

Spend Some Time in Prayer Before the Blessed Sacrament

Our church opens at 6:30 AM and remains open throughout the day for anyone who wants to make a prayerful visit. Please come and have some quiet time with God in the midst of our busy (and sometimes loud) world.

We have times set aside when Our Lord, present in the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the altar for your prayer.

Monday Exposition and Benediction

Every Monday afternoon the Blessed Sacrament is exposed from 2:00 PM until 7:00 PM. This opportunity for prayer ends with Benediction beginning at about 6:45 PM and ending at 7:00 PM

You can come at any time for any length of time to join in this quiet, reflective prayer time.

First Friday Holy Hour

Every First Friday of the month we have a Holy Hour before the exposed Blessed Sacrament. This communal prayer begins at 7:30 PM and run until 8:30 PM, closing with Benediction.

St Joseph Men's Prayer Group

We meet every Tuesday evening at 7:30 PM in the Church where we pray the Rosary.

Afterward we move to the main vestibule for coffee, donuts and fellowship.

Cardinal O'Malley: 'One Nation is Meant to Include All'

Note: Boston Cardinal Sean O'Malley released the following statement Aug. 15 in the wake of a white nationalist demonstration during which an act of violence left one person dead and 19 others injured in Charlottesville, Virginia. This statement was reprinted in the August 25 - September 7 issue of National Catholic Reporter.

Nations live and flourish because of their ideas and ideals, not simply because of their material wealth or power. Our ideas and ideals express our identity and set the standards for our behavior as citizens. For the United States a core statement of our identity is expressed in the phrase *E pluribus unum*, from many peoples we shape one nation. This treasured civic truth reflects and is rooted in the biblical heritage of belief in the dignity of all people, and a shared humanity.

We have not always as a nation reflected the best of our ideas and ideals, but they stand as a goal toward which we strive. Our country is once again in a moment when the civic and biblical heritage is being attacked and tested. We need to reassert and reaffirm the belief that one nation is meant to include all: the multiple races, cultures, ethnicities and religions which make up our country.

The angry and violent mob which gathered in Virginia this past weekend, by word and deed, contradicted our national creed and code of civil conduct. As a nation in the past century we led the struggle against the pagan ideas of Nazism. Those who seek to resurrect a new form of Nazism and extreme nationalism — those who denigrate African Americans, who preach and practice anti-Semitism, who disparage Muslims, those who threaten and seek to banish immigrants in our land — all these voices dishonor the basic convictions of the American political and constitutional traditions. They must be opposed in word and deed.

As a Catholic bishop, I welcome the opportunity to stand with other religious leaders of the land in opposition to the voices of fragmentation and hatred. As the Archbishop of Boston, it is my responsibility to call the Catholic community which I serve to remember the basic truths of faith and reason which are so central at this moment. The truth that our rights and our duties to each other derive from God. The truth that we can successfully oppose hatred and bigotry by civility and charity. These truths can bind us together across racial, religious and ethnic communities. They can help us celebrate our pluralism as a rich treasure which strengthens this land.

Today when our unity is tested, when our basic truths of faith and reason are violated, as people of faith and as citizens we must uphold our ideas and ideals. My prayer is that we can rise to this challenge. My belief is that we are surely capable of doing so.

Labors of Love Build the City of God!

The Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon to fight Muscular Dystrophy was always described as a labor of love. See him sing, "You'll Never Walk Alone" was a Labor Day ritual. Jerry may have made it through the song without crying once in a while but I never did! It has been a few years since Jerry has hosted this annual event and now that he has gone to his reward, we won't ever hear him sing this song live again.

I have two little reflections on this idea of a labor of love this weekend:

1. I mentioned that Jerry Lewis has gone to his reward. Here's why I believe that. I have a friend who is a missionary. He says that the last judgment goes like this - you get to the Pearly Gates and St Peter is there, and behind him are all the people who were in need during your life. He looks at you and then at them and asks them, "Do any of you know this person?" And if one does, you are in (because you responded to their need during their life). Who knows how it really works, but this makes sense if we reflect on Matthew 25: 31-46. Jesus says, "Whatever you do for the least of my brothers or sisters you do for me. Come inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the beginning of time." There are a lot of needy children welcoming Jerry to his reward! As we celebrate Labor day, maybe it is time for each one of us to reflect on the opportunities we have had to live a labor of love for Jesus by serving others. We might find that we need to be more loving or we might rejoice in how often we have responded to Jesus' presence, disguised in the face of others. Look at our parish mission statement on the front of the bulletin and see that your service also serves to invite others into the salvation given to us by Jesus.

2. There is another labor of love that is so much a part of our parish life that we might not even notice it. The loving service given to us at weekend liturgies, and at weddings and funerals by Mike Keller our director of music ministry. This Sunday Mike won't be at all of the masses. He is involved in another labor of love. In addition to being our music minister, and in many ways, Mike is also a father. Today he gets to see his years of labors of love come to some fruition as his son, Michael marries his bride, Loreta. Over the years Mike may have had to differ some family gatherings for a few hours because of a wedding or a funeral on a weekend. Somehow he managed to juggle these two labors of love because his children Kristen and Michael have grown into two very good and loving adults! Mike is one example of a person involved in labors of love. Maybe this Labor Day weekend we can all take a moment or two and reflect on the many labors of love we are involved in. This is how we build the City of God!

A Great Story and a Great Lesson

The first day of school our professor introduced himself and challenged us to get to know someone we didn't already know. I stood up to look around when a gentle hand touched my shoulder. I turned around to find a wrinkled, little old lady beaming up at me with a smile that lit up her entire being.

She said, 'Hi handsome. My name is Rose. I'm eighty-seven years old. Can I give you a hug?' I laughed and enthusiastically responded, 'Of course you may!' and she gave me a giant squeeze.

'Why are you in college at such a young, innocent age?' I asked.. She jokingly replied, 'I'm here to meet a rich husband, get married, and have a couple of kids...' 'No seriously,' I asked. I was curious what may have motivated her to be taking on this challenge at her age.

'I always dreamed of having a college education and now I'm getting one!' she told me. After class we walked to the student union building and shared a chocolate milkshake. We became instant friends. Every day for the next three months we would leave class together and talk nonstop. I was always mesmerized listening to this 'time machine' as she shared her wisdom and experience with me.

Over the course of the year, Rose became a campus icon and she easily made friends wherever she went. She loved to dress up and she reveled in the attention bestowed upon her from the other students. She was living it up.

At the end of the semester we invited Rose to speak at our football banquet. I'll never forget what she taught us. She was introduced and stepped up to the podium. As she began to deliver her prepared speech, she dropped her three by five cards on the floor. Frustrated and a little embarrassed she leaned into the microphone and simply said, 'I'm sorry I'm so jittery. I gave up beer for Lent and this whiskey is killing me!

I'll never get my speech back in order so let me just tell you what I know.' As we laughed she cleared her throat and began, ' We do not stop playing because we are old; we grow old because we stop playing.

There are only four secrets to staying young, being happy and achieving success. You have to laugh and find humor every day. You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die.

We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even know it! There is a huge difference between growing older and growing up. If you are nineteen years old and lie in bed for one full year and don't do one productive thing, you will turn twenty years old. If I am eighty-seven years old and stay in bed for a year and never do anything I will turn eighty-eight. Anybody Can grow older! That doesn't take any talent or ability. The idea is to grow up by always finding opportunity in change. Have no regrets. The elderly usually don't have regrets for what we did, but rather for things we did not do. The only people who fear death are those with regrets.'

She concluded her speech by courageously singing 'The Rose.' She challenged each of us to study the lyrics and live them out in our daily lives. At the year's end Rose finished the college degree she had begun all those months ago.

One week after graduation Rose died peacefully in her sleep.

Over two thousand college students attended her funeral in tribute to the wonderful woman who taught by example that it's never too late to be all you can possibly be.

REMEMBER, We make a Living by what we get. We make a Life by what we give. God promises a safe landing, not a calm passage. If God brings you to it, He will bring you through it.

Respect Life

Barbara Meara, Chairman, NYS Right to Life Committee sent this letter to many pro-lifers, and so we bring it to you:

Dear Friend of NYS Right to Life,

The NYS Legislature wrapped up from their latest session dedicated to targeting the unborn, in a state already run by those who are so committed to pushing abortion.

Just because these bills didn't become law – for now- doesn't mean our work is done. In fact, it's time to fight even harder, as the abortion lobby will be readying their forces, as well.

You see, it's not enough for them that the abortion rates in parts of the state, predominantly New York City, are some of the highest in the country. Planned Parenthood will go to any length to protect their taxpayer funding, and to be able to operate as the nation's largest abortion chain. NARAL (National Abortions Rights Action League) Pro-Choice America is also stepping up by hosting secretive events to promote abortion in this state even further. Clearly, the stakes are high.

It is more important now than ever to educate New Yorkers about the dangers of

late-term abortion, physician assisted suicide, and therefore, through a weekend program called Camp Esther, the next generation of pro-lifers are making friends, learning how to be activists, and fighting for the right to life.

Unlike Planned Parenthood, we do not receive government grants or funds. Not only does that scandal-ridden chain already receive millions of taxpayer dollars a year, NYS politicians want to make PP even richer, using funds from hard-working taxpayers, including those committed to life, like you and me. Let's do our best to stop them!

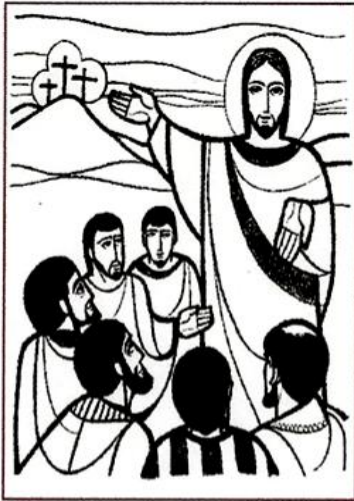

Santa Rosalía (1130-1160) 4 de septiembre

La patrona de Palermo (Italia), que goza de una gran devoción en Sicilia lo mismo que las mártires Águeda de Catania y Lucía de Siracusa, no tiene una historia igualmente rica de testimonios y tradiciones. Un estudio dice que murió en 1160. Octavio Galetani, lamentaba no haber encontrado huellas dejadas por los antepasados sobre esta santa, a pesar de haberlas buscado en todas partes con mucho cuidado. Parece que la santa, a los tres años de su muerte, pensó en colmar esta laguna apareciéndose en octubre de 1623 a una mujer enferma, y ordenándole que fuera en peregrinación a la iglesita sobre el monte Pellegrino, un

áspero promontorio que cierra el golfo de Palermo. La mujer esperó el mes de mayo siguiente para satisfacer el deseo de Santa Rosalía, que se le volvió a aparecer y le dijo el lugar en donde se encontraban sus restos.

El 15 de julio las búsquedas terminaron exitosamente, pero los huesos hallados en una gruta excavada entre las piedras no tenían ninguna inscripción que señalara su pertenencia. Al principio se pensó que no se trataba de restos humanos. El arzobispo de Palermo, Giannettino Doria, nombró una comisión de expertos, médicos y teólogos, que el 11 de febrero de 1625 se pronunció por la autenticidad de las reliquias. Esto suscitó la devoción popular, y el Papa Urbano VIII, en 1630, incluyó el nombre de la santa en el Martirologio Romano para el 15 de julio y el 4 de septiembre.

En ese mismo tiempo, y precisamente el 25 de agosto 1624, cuarenta días después del hallazgo de los huesos, dos albañiles, mientras trabajaban en el convento dominico de San Esteban de Quisquina, encontraron en una gruta una inscripción latina, muy rudimental, que decía: "Ego Rosalia Sinibaldi Quisquinae et Rosarum Domini filia amore Domini mei Jesu Christi in hoc antro habitari decrevi", **yo Rosalia Sinibaldi, hija de las rosas del Señor, por amor de mi Señor Jesucristo he decidido vivir en esta caverna de Quisquina.** Esto confirmaba en parte las tradiciones orales, recogidas por el mismo Galetani, que hablaban de Rosalía, que nació en Palermo y vivió durante algunos años en la corte de la reina Margarita, esposa del rey Guillermo I de Sicilia (1154-1166).

La reina le regaló el monte Pellegrino, y Rosalía fue a vivir allí por la soledad que ofrecía. Vivió haciendo penitencia, y allí murió después de haber peregrinado por otros lugares más desiertos, siguiendo el ejemplo de los antiguos anacoretas.
