The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

This Sacrament is for the living. We celebrate this Sacrament each Spring and Fall for those who are chronically ill, advanced in age, or who are about to undergo surgery or hospitalization. We can arrange the Sacrament at other times by calling the Parish Office.

Welcome Fr Jerry



Every year we have a preacher visit to speak about mission work and to ask for assistance with that work. This weekend, Fr George “Jerry” Hogan will be with us. Fr Jerry is the National Circus Chaplain, appointed by the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops. He will speak at all of our English masses.

When we think about missionary work, we probably don’t think about the circus, but if you think about it, this is very important work. The people who work for the circus are on the road so much, it must be very hard for them to connect with a church. Fr Jerry and his team of priests, religious women, deacons, and lay ministers visit 40 circuses yearly helping to prepare circus people for the Sacraments, plus counseling and having a ministry of presence. I am sure Fr Jerry will have many interesting stories to share.

Likes, Shares, Friend Requests...

I don’t know much about social media - I still have a flip phone - but, because of our parish Face Book page, I have learned a few terms. Underneath any one of our posts, there is a list of likes and shares. You can give the post a thumbs up or you can share it or even make a comment about it.

I have a Face Book account - under a false name just so I can look at our parish page. But my email address is connected to it so I get hundreds of friend requests from people who I can’t possibly know because it is a false name!

Let’s apply these three social media verbs to our lives as Christians

As Christians, each one of us is called to be what My good friend Pope Francis calls **missionary disciples**. That means we are called to follow Jesus and to share him with others. There’s the first social media verb - **share**. When we taste a good meal we want to share the delicious flavor with another. When we read a good book or see a good movie, we want to share it with a friend. Our relationship with God is the most valuable, and even delicious thing we have - Taste and see the goodness of the Lord (Ps 34:8). When was the last time you shared your faith with a friend? It is our calling! As a matter of fact, you can do it really easily because Next Sunday is officially, BRING A FRIEND TO CHURCH SUNDAY. But the truth is, every Sunday is Bring a Friend to Church Sunday. This is what we would call a **friend request**. May I suggest that you don’t just bring them to church, make it an event. Invite them to church and brunch so you can catch up on some face time together.

Now we get to the tough part **likes**. Some people might be afraid their friends won’t like church. Some may even say, “I don’t like church. I just go out of obligation.” If that is the case, then it is time for some personal reflection on our faith life.

At St Joseph School Graduation, Keegan, the valedictorian, quoted me - cool. He said, Fr Mike has told us many times, “If it is a good year, it is on you. If it is a bad year, it is on you.” They had a good year and I am proud of our graduates. Let’s apply that to our celebration. Every one of us should come to church with that attitude. If it is a good celebration, it is on me, and if it is a bad celebration, it is on me. The Second Vatican Council calls all of us to Full Conscious Active Participation in our Eucharistic Liturgies. In other words, Being 100% present is the best way to make the celebration better for me - it really is on me! How can I make it better?

- Read the readings before mass and ask God to speak to you through them. Go to usccb.org/daily-readings, or come early and read from the Journey Songs book.
- Ask God to speak to you at mass in whatever way God wants to. It could be in a reading, a prayer, a song, in reception of Communion, or even in a welcoming smile. Then, after you have asked God for this favor, be open.
- Sing. St Augustine says one who sings, prays twice. Don’t worry about quality just yet. Think about this, everyone participates in singing Happy Birthday because it is a celebration. So is mass. Sing!
- Reflect on your past week. Give your successes and failures to God as your offering when the gifts are prepared. Reflect on your coming week. Give your hopes, dreams, and concerns to God as your offering.
- Be open to God’s grace in Communion. When the minister says, “The Body of Christ,” say in your heart, “We are!” or “Broken for me!” You will be amazed at the impact of this on your prayer at mass.
- Stay to the end and accept your commissioning to bring the Good News into the world. Then **share** what you **like** and make more **friend requests** during the coming week!

Arguing the Pro-Life Position, Part Three

This is a reprint from January 23rd, 2018

The Baby is Unwanted/Unfit

Although this is not the most commonly used argument, it is, sadly, the number one reason that men and women abort their children today. The typical arguments are “if a baby has special needs, they are going to have a tough life, and the family will really struggle”, and “we need abortion to control the strain on the planet’s resources” and “I don’t want a child right now; I can’t afford it”, and “What happens to a baby whose parents are unfit”. These are only valid arguments if life in the womb is valueless. The abortion advocate can neither define, nor defend this position if they base their arguments on science or ethics. The premise of the Pro-Life advocate is that life in the womb’s value is not based on whether or not the mother and father want the child, or will make good parents. *The child’s value comes from God. The child is a member of the Human Race, a member of the world, and God the Father Almighty has endowed that child with a purpose, and a plan. God has bestowed amazing potential on that child, and that potential is the same before, or after birth.*

“I don’t want a child right now; I can’t afford it”

Pro-Life advocate and ethicist Scott Klusendorf trains people against this argument using a concept he calls “trot out the toddler.” If we agree with science, medicine, ethics, and philosophy, then we agree that life in the womb is equal to life outside the womb. So if someone makes the argument that they cannot afford the baby, we have an easy response: “if the mother has a toddler, why not kill him? The toddler is probably more expensive than the baby anyhow. The mother will save more money with this solution!”

“If a baby has special needs, they are going to have a tough life, and the family will really struggle”

Again, if it is alright to abort a child with special needs, simply because of these needs, why is it not okay to kill toddlers with these same special needs? The unfortunate element to this argument is that there are a growing number of extremists in our country who would have no problem with this proposition.

“What happens to a baby whose parents are unfit?”

Okay, what about pre-schoolers who are living in those conditions now? If we simply eliminate them we can save them years of hurt and pain at home. Of course this is a ridiculous proposition. If we discovered a five year old was being abused, we would not kill the five year old. We would do everything in our power to protect that child. If that is the case, why would ever be okay with killing a child before birth because of the potential that the child would be born into a difficult home?

As Catholics, we are morally obligated to defend life at all its stages. We are making some progress in our fight. There has been a decrease in abortions each of the past three years, but we still have a long way to go. Please consider becoming an active member of the Respect Life Ministry. We need your help!
